


VALE Paul Erbs



ASBESTOS AWARENESS PROFILE

Professor Tim Driscoll – Sydney University

Tim Driscoll is an occupational epidemiologist and specialist in occupational and environmental medicine and public health medicine. He works as professor in epidemiology and occupational medicine in the Sydney School of Public Health at the University of Sydney, Australia, where he runs the general epidemiology teaching and is Director of the Master of Public Health.

In terms of research, Tim main areas of interest are the burden of occupational disease and injury; occupational cancer and exposure to occupational carcinogens, particularly asbestos; occupational fatal injury; increasing the practical application and influence of epidemiological principles and findings; and improving the communication of epidemiological principles and findings to the general public. Asbestos-related disease has been a focus for much of Tim's work, commencing in late 1990 when he joined the epidemiology unit in the National Occupational Health and Safety Institute at the National Occupational Health and Safety Commission, known more widely as WorkSafe Australia. Jim Leigh was head of the unit and a fierce leader of research into occupational lung disease, including asbestos-related disease, and Tim first worked on some of Jim's projects, later taking Jim's place as head of the



Mesothelioma Register, which was run by WorkSafe. With a touch of circularity, the Mesothelioma Register closed due to privacy restrictions, was re-born several years later as the Mesothelioma Registry, funded by SafeWork Australia, and after being run on their behalf by the NSW Cancer Institute, is now run


by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, with Tim as the Chair of Expert Advisory Group.

At about the time he left WorkSafe Australia in 2001 when it moved from Sydney to Canberra, Tim was invited to work on the World Health Organization's (WHO) global burden of disease. Twenty

years later he still working in this area, with asbestos being one of the main areas of focus. Tim is now head of the Occupational Risk Factors Expert Working Group for the current Global Burden of Disease study run by the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME) at the University of Washington in Seattle. The information from the study, and the previous WHO version, has been very important in highlighting the terrible legacy of asbestos exposure in high-income countries and the likely burden of disease that will result from the on-going use of asbestos in low and middle-income countries.

As a result of this work and other relevant experience, Tim has worked on a number of specific asbestos-related problems, including asbestos contamination of soil, especially in previous industrial areas being reclaimed for commercial and domestic purposes. He also has worked with and been a supporter of the Asbestos Safety and Eradication Agency (ASEA) and is currently a member of the agency's research and evaluation committee.

Having retired from playing serious footy in his mid-30s, Tim turned to running to try to maintain some level of fitness. Now he tries to run four times a week, and swim twice a week (although he sees this more as punishment rather than enjoyment), and for many years has run on Sunday mornings with a well-known committed asbestos control campaigner and previous ASEA member, Nick Miller.



ASBESTOS AWARENESS PROFILE

Dr Tom John – Peter Mac, Melbourne

Thanks for the opportunity to talk about my research. I am a medical oncologist at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre in Melbourne. My focus of research is thoracic cancers including lung cancer and mesothelioma.

I developed a specific interest in mesothelioma while conducting laboratory based research in Toronto in 1998-2000 conducting post-doctoral research after completing my medical degree and PhD in Melbourne. At that time, we were taking tumour samples from patients with lung cancer and looking to grow those tumours in mice. We extended this to also look at mesothelioma and it was surprising to see that only 40% of the mesotheliomas we tried to grow actually grew, but invariably those tumours represented a more aggressive type of mesothelioma even though they looked the same as other tumours under the microscope.

Subsequently on returning to Melbourne in 2000 I received a grant from the Cancer Council Victoria to establish what I called a Mesothelioma Collaborative between the Austin Hospital and Monash. The idea was to put together all of our samples and use this to look at biomarkers and potential therapies. Much of this work has been published in high quality journals and I have had now had three PhD students conducting research in mesothelioma around this project.



Some of that research pointed towards using novel therapies in mesothelioma. The idea was to see if the therapies worked in a petri dish and then in mice with mesothelioma. We have been excited with the results and were hoping to develop clinical trials for one of these agents, but unfortunately were unable to do this as the company decided not to continue studies using that drug. We are still completing some other studies

in the lab with these drugs and there is a chance we will get an opportunity to use them as therapies if we can show good efficacy.

The second group of therapies we are looking at uses drugs currently used to treat leukemia that were developed at the WEHI. We have found that the these agents are very effective in the petri dish and are looking to expand those studies with a view to using them in clinical trials.

Currently I am looking to run a study where we take a closer look at the DNA of mesotheliomas to try to detect mutations that we can treat with targeted therapies, or so we can identify pathways that we can potentially block. We are also planning to collect blood to see if we can measure tumour DNA in the blood.

Researching mesothelioma is not an easy task. The resources available are nowhere near what is available in other tumour types and funding to conduct such research is limited. But it is also an area of unmet need as treatments have not changed for nearly 20 years.

Apart from the laboratory, I am also a clinician treating people with thoracic cancers. I am heavily involved in clinical trials not just in mesothelioma but also lung cancers. Some of these studies have changed practice in lung cancer and I am proud to be at the forefront of clinical research in Australia. Ideally I would hope to use this experience to develop practice changing therapies in mesothelioma. We are about to open several clinical trials in mesothelioma. This is a way of accessing potentially more active therapies to what we currently use.

I am lucky to have a supportive wife and three lovely children. I love playing music and use it as downtime to reset after busy and often trying days. I look forward to the time when we can go out and enjoy live music and each other's company in the near future!

Perdita Dickson – Worksafe Victoria

PERDITA DICKSON Senior Occupational Hygienist Major Construction Projects – Regulated Industries Division WorkSafe Victoria

Occupational Hygiene is a very broad profession focusing on hazards that cause ill health to people in the workplace. This can range from noise to heat to chemicals and asbestos. It is the focus on people's health and in particular the long-term impact that is a key interest for me and why I enjoy my role at WorkSafe Victoria so much.

My role is within the major construction projects team which has oversight of the large governmental transport infrastructure projects as well as the power station demolitions in the Latrobe Valley.

I am also a representative at the Latrobe Valley Asbestos Taskforce with other government agencies, local councils, unions and ACV/GARDS. This has been a personally and professional satisfying group to be part of mainly due to the collaboration of everyone involved and


aligned goal of eliminating asbestos related illnesses in the Latrobe Valley and beyond.

Another key strategy of the Latrobe Valley Asbestos Taskforce is to raise awareness about asbestos which I apply at home as well. Which has meant that my two young children may be the only one in their class who know about asbestos and are pretty good at picking out buildings that may contain it.

I think it is really important that the younger generation are aware of the risks of asbestos and it becomes normal practice to properly manage it at work and at home. Personally I love coming to Gippsland (not so often now with COVID-19) both to visit family and friends and also camp in the beautiful country side so it's been great being part of the Latrobe Valley Asbestos Taskforce, to at least keep engaged with the area.

That is probably another key thing of my role that I enjoy, meeting people from different industries and groups that are involved in reducing asbestos related illnesses.



Demolition of Hazelwood Power Station



Reports on Hazelwood Power Station from ENGIE Hazelwood air and asbestos monitoring demonstrates good results

Extensive monitoring for air quality and asbestos carried out in conjunction with Monday's (25 May) controlled collapse of the eight Hazelwood chimneys has returned good results.

Environmental monitoring and analyses undertaken by independent hygienists have confirmed that no external asbestos fibre impacts arose from the demolition works. This has been confirmed via both soil samples and airborne asbestos monitors, installed at numerous locations within and around the boundary of the Hazelwood site.

From a dust perspective, with reference to the EPA Airwatch Criteria, the monitoring results have confirmed that the air quality at the site's perimeter remained of a good standard with reference to PM2.5 and PM10 post the chimney demolition.

The area where the chimneys were felled, between the power station block and the former coal slot bunker, has been designated an asbestos working area

while rubble removal works continue, with appropriate safety precautions in place, and will be treated as such until a satisfactory inspection at the conclusion of removal works. All of the waste will be transported on an internal road system to the EPA-approved, on-site asbestos cell for safe disposal. Dust suppression systems will be maintained for the duration of the removal works.

These excellent results, after a period of considerable planning, should provide comfort to the local community and the Hazelwood Project contractors and workforce.

ENGIE Hazelwood management congratulated the entire team, including the numerous local emergency services support agencies, who successfully achieved one of the major milestone activities of the Hazelwood Rehabilitation Project demolition program.

"In particular, we extend our congratulations to the demolition contractor, Delta Group," an ENGIE spokesperson said. "This was a sizeable and very public demolition project, and to have it carried out so professionally and successfully is a credit to Delta and its entire team."

Public interest in the demolition was reflected in the number of livestream

views of the demolition across numerous websites.

"We nonetheless acknowledge that this was a sad day for many people, including those who are currently working on the project. The Hazelwood Power Station has played a big part in the Latrobe Valley landscape and community since the 1960s and the contribution of employees, sub-contractors and other support agencies to electricity production for the whole of Victoria is acknowledged."

The demolition of the eight chimneys was a major milestone in the multi-year program of rehabilitation works across the site of the former Hazelwood mine and Power Station, to create a safe, stable and sustainable landform.

Demolition of the former power station including the chimneys is a vital element in ensuring public health and safety. As with other major industrial sites constructed in the 1960s, the former station contains significant amounts of asbestos and cannot be left to deteriorate.

All asbestos or asbestos related materials is being safely contained in an on-site, Environment Protection Authority licensed asbestos waste landfill cell. All of the chimney rubble has now been

cleared and placed in the containment cell which has been developed under strict regulatory guidelines and is subject to regular and on-going safety and environmental audits to ensure compliance. All materials are handled by specialist A-Class asbestos removalists under an Asbestos Management and Control Plan, which includes monitoring and inspection by independent hygienists. As well, there is a Senior Victorian Work Safe Inspector on site full time.

All major demolition works on the site are expected to be completed in 2022.

Dredger fell success

The first of the dredger demolition works carried out on Thursday (15 October 2020) at the Hazelwood Rehabilitation Project proved a success.

Dredger 11 came down a little after 10am with the key objectives of the demolition realised. The main outcome, a safe and successful fell, was achieved with the dredger on the ground.

All of the blast cutting charges were fully expended with no misfires. A thermal imaging sweep conducted by drone after the controlled collapse showed no issues with hot spots in the mine. The immediate geotechnical surveys also showed no issues and batter stability throughout the mine was not compromised.

However a minor area of heated material inside the dredger, stoked by late

afternoon wind, created a smoulder. It was picked up by the established monitoring and safety procedures at around 3.30pm. It was promptly and successfully addressed with the CFA in attendance as a precaution and was quickly under control.

Post-blast monitoring continued for a further 24 hours to ensure the overall area has not been impacted for batter stability.

As previously advised, the remaining three demolitions will take place from October through to December.

The four largest dredgers are being explosively blast felled to achieve an engineered controlled collapse and subsequently mechanically dismantled, with materials removed for recycling over a period of time.

The controlled collapse methodology has been selected by ENGIE Hazelwood's demolition contractor Delta Group for health and safety reasons, following a detailed options analysis and risk assessment process in consultation with regulatory agencies.

The size and design of the dredgers

is such that attempts to demolish by conventional means are deemed potentially dangerous. The explosive cutting charges will enable the dredgers to be brought to ground for safe dismantling, removal and recycling.

The works will take place over a number of weeks from mid-October until December 2020.

There is no remaining asbestoscontaining material in any of the dredgers. All such components have been removed during decommissioning and demolition preparation.






Loy Yang B Power Station



Silicosis:

an ongoing challenge in Australia

The appalling outbreak of silicosis amongst stonemasons in Australia, associated with the surge in demand for artificial stone benchtops over the past two decades, continues to be a growing concern as more workers continue to be tragically diagnosed with this preventable condition.



Silica dust

Silica is one of the most common minerals found in the earth's crust. It is found in rock such as granite, sandstone, slate, sand, and glass. Crystalline silica (often called "silica dust") is the form known to be a health hazard when particles are inhaled. Inhalation of silica can cause serious health problems down the track.

Common places you may encounter silica include:

- Manufacture or installation of engineered or artificial stone products such as benchtops which have a very high level of silica, typically 90% or more
- Cutting or drilling into concrete, cement sheet, tiles, and bricks
- Sand blasting
- Road construction
- Sweeping construction and debris



Silica-related conditions

Silicosis is a permanent irreversible scarring of the lungs usually detected through lung function testing (spirometry) and radiography. It is a progressive condition that may start off asymptomatic and become symptomatic and more disabling over time. Common symptoms are shortness of breath, initially on exertion and sometimes at rest as the disease progresses and also a cough.

There are three kinds of silicosis: acute, chronic, and accelerated.

- Acute silicosis causes symptoms such as inflammation, severe shortness of breath and lowered blood oxygen levels when high levels of silica exposure occur over a short period of time
- Chronic silicosis develops after longer term exposure to silica, causing difficulty breathing, painful swelling in the lungs and lymph nodes



 Accelerated silicosis can develop more rapidly after moderate to high levels of exposure, causing lung scarring, trouble breathing and inflammation

Silicosis is most commonly associated with silica dust exposure, but silica dust can also cause other conditions like chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, scleroderma, kidney disease and increases the risk of lung cancer.

Treatment for silicosis

There is no known cure for silicosis, but progression can be slowed, and symptoms managed, especially when diagnosed early. A diagnosis of silicosis usually necessitates ceasing work in dusty environments.

There have been some promising recent developments in the treatment and management of silicosis. Clinicians at Brisbane's Prince Charles Hospital and researchers at the University of Queensland have developed a world-first treatment called a whole lung lavage which works by washing out the silica crystals and damaged cells from the lungs. So far, recipients of this procedure have reported positive results providing much needed hope for sufferers of silicosis. WorkSafe Health Screening

WorkSafe's free silicosis health screening program has now been underway in Victoria for a couple of years. The program is designed to detect silicosis in stonemasons in Victoria as early as possible. All past and present workers in the stonemason industry are eligible for a free health assessment. To start the process, contact WorkSafe Advisory Service on 1800 136 089.

At this stage, Worksafe's free health screening program has not been extended to workers exposed to silica dust in other industries. However, these workers can and should speak to their doctor about getting screened at their own cost if they are concerned about their health.



Compensation for silicosis

In most cases, sufferers of silicosis are entitled to compensation. In Victoria, where a worker is exposed to silica dust in employment after 31 August 1985, they will be entitled to claim worker's compensation benefits.

At a minimum, sufferers of silicosis with an accepted Victorian WorkCover claim are entitled to claim weekly payments for their time off work and the reasonable costs of:

- Medical investigations, care, and treatment
- Gym memberships and programs
- Psychological support and counselling
- Retraining and access to vocational rehabilitation services

Depending on when a worker was exposed to silica dust, they may be entitled to additional lump sum compensation. Precisely when a lump sum claim is lodged is critical to the likely success of a claim, so it is important to get legal advice as soon as possible and before lodging any lump sum claim. The Victorian WorkCover laws as they currently stand, do not allow a worker to make another lump sum claim if the first claim is unsuccessful.

If a worker dies as a result of a silica-related condition, their dependants may be entitled to additional dependency benefits including the costs of funeral and burial services, counselling, a pension, and a lump sum.

It is important to get legal advice as soon as possible as strict time limits apply to this area of

Preventing silica-related conditions

Silica-related conditions can be prevented through adequate dust control and ventilation, respiratory protection, and regular health monitoring.

Safe Work Australia publishes exposure standards for airborne contaminants in the workplace.

The exposure standard for crystalline silica dust is 0.05mg/m3 as a TWA (time-weighted average) airborne concentration over 8 hours.

However, WorkSafe Victoria recommends that employees are not exposed to levels above 0.02mg/m3 as a TWA. This is a precautionary measure to prevent silicosis, and to minimise the risk of lung cancer.

In 2019, the Victorian Government implemented new regulations banning the uncontrolled dry cutting of artificial stone.

Case Study:

Mark was diagnosed with silicosis as result of his work as a stonemason over 7 years. Mark lodged a WorkCover claim which was accepted. He now gets weekly payments from the WorkCover insurer to help ease the financial burden of losing his livelihood as it is no longer safe for him to work as a stonemason. In addition, the insurer is paying for Mark to retrain in a new trade, giving him the opportunity to pursue an alternative career path.

Fortunately, for now, Mark's condition remains stable and he is not experiencing significant problems with his breathing. However, silicosis can get worse long after exposure to silica dust has stopped. In Mark's case, if his condition progresses, he will be entitled to an impairment benefit lump sum from the WorkCover insurer.

Mark may also be able to sue his old employer for compensation for his pain and suffering and lost income as a result of their negligence in exposing him to silica dust, as the dangers of silica dust have been well known for decades yet his employer did not adequately protect him. The Victorian laws require that certain thresholds are met before an employee can sue their employer so whether Mark can make a claim will depend on whether his condition progresses and how and to what extent his life is permanently impacted.

What to do next?

If you or a loved one has been exposed to silica dust or has been diagnosed with silicosis or another silica-related condition, it's important to get legal advice as soon as possible as strict time limits apply to this area of law.

When faced with a silicosis diagnosis, your life can get turned upside down.
Understandably, legal proceedings may be the last thing you wish to deal with. The specialised team at Gordon Legal believe in making this process as easy as it can possibly be. 






Around 80% of homes in the City of Latrobe contain asbestos
